WHAT'S THE BIG DEAL ABOUT SIN?

Although not everyone will necessarily ask this question quite this way, there are a number of people, young and old, who will ask this, or a version of this question of me from time to time. Their view of sin is that it is basically just a mistake, small vices, no big deal. Sin, in their view, is certainly not serious enough an issue to merit hell! And all the “hand-wringing” by us Bible-banger types is really nothing more than hysterical religiosity -- sound and fury, signifying nothing. But is it mere sound and fury signifying nothing? Or are there solid reasons for the hand-wringing?

Well, sin is, first of all, disobedience to God. That definition may be news to some. Occasionally, I run into people who believe that sin is merely violating some man-made moral traditions or rules of “the church” or some unsmiling, ivory-towered clergyman bent on ruling the world with his capricious codes of conduct. But that is not so; sin is the choice we sometimes make to disobey the benevolent Creator. Although some sinful men prefer to reframe their deeds as freedom’s exercise, the truth is far uglier and horrific. It is staring in the face of love, benevolence, care, patience, and life and spitting in His eye — spitting in the eye of the One with the power to create and power to destroy, the power to save and the power to condemn to an eternal Hell. What was Adam and Eve thinking? What are we thinking, when we choose to sin? Who do we think we are? Are we stronger than God? Are we suicidal; masochistic; fools? The stupid impudence of sin is nothing less than stunning, when we stop and think about it for even a moment.

Sin is also harmful to others. Oh yes, I’ve heard all the vacuous arguments before about how some sins really don’t harm anyone — lust, covetousness, and what consenting adults might do in privacy. This is just so wrong! These are the same people who complain to God so loudly later about the senseless pain and suffering that they and others have to endure, while God sits idly by. What harm is sin to others? Much! Many of you may have heard of the “butterfly effect”. Although it is most often used in the world of meteorology — the observation that an event as seemingly insignificant as the flapping of a butterfly’s wings might create a disturbance (even if very small at first) that, in the chaotic motion of the atmosphere, may possibly lead to a huge storm in a distant place — it is the perfect explanation of how our small, seemingly insignificant, sinful deeds do indeed lead to great consequences. It is the multiplied little sins of this world — those little “white” ones — that have helped create the massive evil of the world. But even the one in the Garden of Eden, a mere bite of a forbidden fruit (how serious could that be?), is the reason for death, decay, and broken fellowship with God in this world. That one little sin was the beginning of sorrow, tears, sickness, sadness, pain, and grief.

Sin is also harmful to you personally. I won’t dwell on this point too much here, because it is so self evident. We are all quite aware of how badly we mess ourselves up with our sins; we toss and turn in bed in a bad conscience over them at night. We make new year resolutions to improve ourselves, because we are dissatisfied with what we’ve become. We

remember who we used to be in our innocence, and wonder whatever became of that little boy or girl. Sin has scarred and gnarled the conscience and character of everyone. Sin does indeed harm us.

Sin jeopardizes your soul. The consequence of spitting in the face of the Creator is separation from Him, the very source of life itself, the source of light and goodness and benevolence. And if we remain unredeemed — Jesus came and died and rose again to redeem us — we get separated from all that is good, right, light, kind forever. That is Hell. Some folks complain that this world is Hell, and sure enough their lives are (because of sin) pretty lacking in goodness; but even so there is good in their lives from God, who causes His sun to shine on the evil and the good. Prison is a place even more bereft of goodness, surrounded by criminals, violence, and evil; but even so, there is still a modicum of order by means of the prison’s rules and guards. Hell will be worse, because there will be no goodness, no light, no right, no protection, no grace, no blessing — nothing but being completely surrounded by the sin and evil we thought to be so harmless.

What’s the big deal about sin? We’ve really only touched the hem of the garment in this short bulletin article, but the bottom line is that it is a very big deal indeed.
