# Bridling the Tongue

We're all aware that Christian language should be different than worldly language. Jesus taught it: Matthew 12:33-37 "...But I tell you that every careless word that people speak, they shall give an accounting for it in the day of judgment. For by your words you will be justified, and by your words you will be condemned." And Paul gave us more details about what that means in Ephesians 4:29-5:4, when he said, Ephesians 4:29-5:4 "Let no unwholesome word proceed from your mouth, but only such a word as is good for edification ...and there must be no filthiness and silly talk, or coarse jesting, which are not fitting, but rather giving of thanks." But the most shocking passage about our words is found in James 1:26 — "If anyone thinks himself to be religious, and yet does not bridle his tongue but deceives his own heart, this man's religion is worthless." A fuller translation of this verse would would be, "If anyone thinks himself to be a worshipper of God, and yet does not control and lead his own tongue but deceives his own heart, this man's worshipping is nothing in God's sight." Wow! Apparently, bridling (controlling and leading) the tongue is a bit more important than we may have thought. So, where should Christians be leading our speech?

## NOT IN CRITICAL, CUTTING, HATEFUL, OR UNKIND; BUT EDIFYING AND HELPFUL WORDS

Although the world is full of gratuitous criticism (Jesus calls this "judgment" in Matt. 7:1), gossip, cutdowns, hateful terms (the Bible calls this "reviling"), and unkind words — and even revels in them — the Christian must not be influenced by or adopt this sort of language. It is typical of children in their immaturity, but it isn't fun or funny. Christians will grow out of it. Such language is destructive of relationships, is hurtful and vicious, and decidedly un-Christian. Paul taught, (Colossians 4:6) "Let your speech always be with grace, as though seasoned with salt, so that you will know how you should respond to each person." And the salt he is speaking of here is not the same as "salty language", rather it is the "salt of the earth" (Matthew 5:13) language that make a godly difference.

### NOT IN FALSE, BUT TRUTHFUL WORDS

The world is full of lies, half-truths, and even lying silences; and even though they'd all agree that it is wrong, they find ways of justifying it and make a tremendous living out of it — it's just business. And because we are surrounded by a world full of falseness, the influence on Christians can be substantial. But Christian words need to be truthful;

we need to be a beacon of light and truth in business, in personal relations, and in all our dealings with others. Satan, Jesus said, is the father of lies (John 8:44).

## NOT IN CURSES, NAMES, PROFANITIES, OR OBSCENITIES; BUT FITTING WORDS

It used to be that such language, if it was ever used, was confined to private conversations among men of low status. If such words occurred in the public square, it received a quick rebuke. But over the last 50 years "swearing" has become commonplace on TV and movies, in songs, among men of high position, among women and even children — and sometimes even among Christians. Curses (calling on God to hurt someone), names (trying to label someone as something bad), profanities (using God's name or some other holy thing in an unholy fashion), and obscenity (a term for something that is shocking or revolting) is all air pollution that has nothing to do with fossil fuels and carbon emissions! "Fitting words" is what the Lord requires — what you would expect from someone wearing the name Christian.

### NOT IN GRUMBLING OR COMPLAINING, BUT JOYFUL AND COOPERATIVE

Most of us feel like we are entitled to grumble and complain about what we don't like. If we're unhappy, we want the world to know it, we want change, now! But this was one of the great sins of Israel in the wilderness, always complaining about the circumstances of the wilderness, continually comparing their current situation to an idealized Egypt, forgetting the blessings and benefits and promises of God. Now, on the one hand God invites us to present our petitions to Him, but on the other hand, we need to be careful about grumbling especially because it's so easy to do. It tends to spread and cause general dissatisfaction and loss of faith and ultimately rebellion and disobedience. Instead, the Lord invites us to 1) know that He does hear us, 2) be joyful in the blessings we have now (contentment), 3) cooperate with the Lord's plan because He knows best and has our best interests at heart.

As Christians, let's watch our tongues; bridle, control, and lead them — rather than the other way around.
