HOW TO HANDLE THE GOSPEL

Paul tells Timothy to be "handling aright the word of truth" (2 Tim. 2:15). Wresting the Scriptures is suicidal (2 Pet. 3:16). Since our world is so plagued by this fault, we will do well to review how to handle the Gospel properly.

BE NOT ASHAMED OF IT

Paul suffered hunger, beatings, imprisonment, stoning, probably even death. Why? He was not ashamed of the Gospel (Rom. 1:16). Those who become so worldly-wise and proud that they do not want to be identified with the Lord's church are ashamed of the Gospel and thereby mishandle it.

DO NOT PERVERT IT

Some were doing this in the Galatian churches (Gal. 1:17). Man cannot be content with the only perfect message he will ever receive! But when we change it, it is no longer God's good news; it is bad news.

OBEY IT

Christ will render vengeance on them that "obey not the Gospel" (2 Thess. 1:8). To pass from darkness to light, man must obey the Gospel plan of salvation. To "Walk in the light as He is in the light", we must continue to obey the Gospel throughout our lives.

DEFEND IT

Some misguided people have been teaching that the Gospel does not need to be defended by its followers. It it needs no defense, why not argue that it needs no offense? If it can defend itself, why can't it also proclaim itself? Paul was in prison, because he defended the Gospel and he said he was ready to further defend it (Phil. 1:7,16). To fail to defend it is to mishandle it (Jude 3).

HOLD FAST TO IT

Our salvation depends upon loyalty to the Gospel in precept and practice (1 Cor. 15:1,2,58). Let us not drift away (Heb. 2:1-3) and make shipwreck of the faith (1 Tim. 1:19).

LIVE WORTHY OF IT

What a challenge this is, when the perfection of the Gospel is considered (Phil 1:27; Eph. 4:1). What do our neighbors and our fellow workers think of the church, because of our manner of speech and conduct?

PREACH IT

Salt is no good in the shaker. The Gospel must be shared, not shelved. "Woe is unto me, if I preach not the Gospel (1 Cor. 9:16).


Have you visited our church website recently? It carries a lot of the most

SUMMER TIME DANGERS

Summer is a wonderful time of the year. Full of recreation, yard and garden work, vacations, camping trips, beach trips, and other precious opportunities to "get away from it all". But in the midst of this summertime bliss are dangers. No, I'm not talking about sunburn, snakes, or Lyme Disease. I'm speaking of hazards of a spiritual nature, often going unrecognized, which makes them even more dangerous.

The temptation to forsake the assembly

When the weather is so nice, and the week (or even the winter) has been so long, it becomes easy to make excuses for ourselves about church attendance. Many of our denominational neighbors have long ago conceded to this tendency and typically call off services for parts of or all of the summer. But it must not be so among God's people. Hebrews 10:25 commands us to not forsake the assembling of ourselves together. Does God take vacation? Is there a season, when you don't need to glorify Him? Is there a week or two in your life, when you don't need Christian encouragement to live for Christ? Is there a season, when your Christian family doesn't need your encouragement? In case you were wondering, the answer to all these questions is "No!" My place, your place, and every Christian's place on the Lord's Day is with the Lord's people—here or elsewhere; don't abandon church services for even a single week.

The temptation to undress too much

Immodesty has become, in modern times a litmus test for sophistication and "high" fashion. Failure to show enough skin, enough cleavage, or enough contures is usually taken for proof that one is out of step and probably has Victorian morals (gasp!). But it must not be so among God's people.

Immodest dress is biblically condemned not only in specific prohibitions against sensuality, but also in the clearly implicit principles of the Bible's stories. The first thing, for example, that Adam and Eve realized after eating the forbidden fruit was their nakedness, which they immediately attempted to correct with the first thing at hand, fig leaves (Gen 3:7). Immodest dress, among other things, violates the first principle of conscience.

This is not even to speak of the problem of being a stumbling block to someone else. And please don't even attempt to use the old "that's not my problem" rationalization. While none of us can control what others think, we all, with only a little common sense, know how to dress so as to stay cool (temperature-wise) and minimize lust. Jesus said (Matt. 18:6) that if we cause someone to stumble, it would have been better for us to have a heavy stone tied to us and be drowned. Now, while this principle applies to a broad range of things, immodest dress is certainly one of them. These are serious words for a serious problem.

The temptation to "repurpose" what we purposed

Being gone from our usual congregation and having heavy vacation expenses, etc. we can be tempted to "repurpose" our usual contribution to the Lord's work to other things—vacations, entertainment, etc. But it must not be so among God's people. As we purposed in our hearts to give (2 Cor. 9:7), we made a promise to our God that we really should not renege on or "repurpose" for vacation fun.

No matter the season...

In Matthew 6:33 Jesus exhorts us to "seek first the kingdom of God". Let us commit ourselves to putting the Lord upon the throne of our hearts on Sunday, in our wardrobes, and in our pocketbooks, no matter the season.
